

### STEMinence Update

Science, technology, engineering, and math stepped out into the spotlight at our first STEM Expo. Students, parents and staff were also able to celebrate the kick off of a two year initiative to transform the school into one of the few STEM certified schools in the state!

A STEM Expo differs from a Science Fair primarily in shifting from a competitive event to a collaborative event. Students worked in small groups to research, design, and build prototypes and models including slow release pills, prosthetic hands, rollercoasters, rockets, parachutes, and lungs that inhale and exhale. Primary students investigated the five senses and created "smellenators" that helped them smell at a distance.

Adding to the excitement, Eminence Elementary also announced and celebrated receiving a \$628,850 school improvement grant from the state. With the grant, Eminence Elementary will provide afterschool and summer remediation and extensions, support development of staff and school administration, and implement a STEM curriculum. This grant is applied over four years to spur dramatic school improvement.

The process to become STEM certified is a challenging process. There are currently only 30 STEM certified schools in the state, one being Morgan County's very own Brooklyn STEM Academy. The process includes redesigning curriculum and physical spaces to deeply integrate science, technology, engineering, and math throughout the day. The school must leverage community partnerships to complete projects and solve real-world problems.
